Today, I'm here to recognize the 2025 AAUW Named Gift Honorees. This is a recognition that branches and individuals can give through contributions to AAUW Funds. In this case, it is the AAUW National Greatest Needs Fund.

Each year at our annual meeting, we take a moment to celebrate an AAUW Somerset Hills member by naming a Named Gift Honoree. This recognition highlights the dedication, service, and spirit of women who have contributed to our branch and to AAUW's mission of advancing equity for women and girls.

This year, our branch felt called to do something a little different. Over the past three years, we have lost a number of cherished members — women who were part of our branch family, who gave generously of themselves, and who helped shape our community. Rather than honoring one individual this year, we have chosen to honor all of them together.

So, who were these women?

As we remember them, it's natural to feel a sense of loss—but also a sense of gratitude. They were women who believed in the power of education, who supported each other, and who made our branch a little brighter, a little stronger. The AAUW Named Gift Honoree is a recognition that branches and individuals can give through contributions to AAUW

When a branch makes contributions of \$750 or more in a year, it earns the opportunity to designate one or more Named Gift Honorees.

The branch then selects a member (or members) to honor — not with money, but with recognition.

It's a way to say thank you to members who have given outstanding service, leadership, or support to the branch or to AAUW's mission.

The honoree's name becomes associated with AAUW's educational and equity funds, symbolically linking their contributions with the larger mission of advancing equity for women and girls.

In most branches, this is the highest honor a member can receive from their local AAUW.





Somerset Hills AAUW Scholarship Academic Year 2025-26 RVCC Recipients Kelly Ronca Liberal Arts

I had spent so many years of my life cursing my past, and yet as I matured, I realized I hadn't made any progress to better any of it. I was stuck in this neverending abuse/victim cycle. That very day, I stepped over what I call the 'invisible line'. I vowed to myself that I would no longer be who I was and would take active steps to better myself and my situation. I sought out counseling, read self-help books, joined group therapy, volunteered my time and focused on myself. Little by little, my life got better. I developed friendships, got married, had children, engaged with others, continued to volunteer and finally, returned to school to continue my education.

I am currently seeking a liberal arts degree at RVCC. I work full time for the United States Postal Service and I am also a full time (now)single parent. Two summers ago, I returned to college after spending 20+ years at home raising my family. While I love my job and loved being home raising children, my passion has since turned to learning American Sign Language (ASL).

Donna Sozzio Paralegal Studies

I am presently a literacy volunteer and on the committee in my hometown for the stigma free council.

We are trying to get all of our town to sign the pledge for being stigma free for mental health and substance disorders. This way our residents will more likely ask for the help they need. I have also been a Red Cross volunteer and served in Alabama when there were tornados. It was the best experience I ever had as I learned the victims thought of themselves as survivors which was awesome to me. I looked up to these individuals and learned important lessons from them. I want to help the less fortunate by using my skills and education to help those children get the help and support they need with their individualized education plan. Sometimes you need to advocate for your rights and I want to be there for those children.

My majors are paralegal studies, criminal justice and liberal arts. I have one year to go and look forward to getting a bachelors degree from Stockton University in liberal arts. I also want to be volunteer as a teachers aide in Newark. I want to help those students wherever I can.

I am a survivor of multiple types of abuse and have a learning disability. I suffer from mental health issues. I live way below the poverty line and feel this has made me a stronger person. The funds will help me in so many ways. It will certainly help with my tuition and books. It will also help me with the tools I need for my visual arts class which can be very expensive.

I am grateful to any scholarship I can receive because without this money I will not be able to attend my last two semesters. I am begging you to help me fulfill my dream of completing college at sixty-nine years of age.




